	A focus on the historical and cultural linkages between Africa and the African Diaspora in the
	Americas. Specifically, this brand of scholarship contrasts content and aesthetics in works by Afro-
	Hispanics writing from within West Africa and the Americas, and their English-speaking
	counterparts in West Africa. One of my conference presentations for instance, hinged upon a New
	Historicist approach to draw comparisons between the aesthetics of Colombia's Manuel Zapata
	Olivella and the Nigerian Ben Okri to uncover how both writers appropriate commonalities of
	history and culture to discern a counter discourse of the African/African Diasporan milieu.
